
Playing Up - On The Neck


Standard chords usually involve only the first three frets. Chords further up the neck of the uke can give a different sound, adding variety and interest to your playing.

There are two main groups of chords that can be played up the neck:

- 1. **Movable chords** chords that use all four strings.
 - a. Moving these chords up (or down) the neck a fret at a time changes their pitch by a semitone.
 - b. Some handy movable chords:



- c. Try it....does D7 with the barre at the 5^{th} fret = E7? Does Bm with the barre at fret 5 = Dm?
- 2. **Open String chords** chords up the neck with sympathetic open strings
 - a. Technical name "inversions"
 - b. Some of these chords are familiar shapes, while others are quite different.....
 - c. The open strings in the chords form part of the chord structure
 - d. Here are some examples:



- e. Try playing Folsom Prison Blues (G, G7, C, D) and Still Haven't Found What I'm Looking For (D, A, G) using chords up the neck.
